

Crime Prevention

In recent years, citizens have depended more and more on local law enforcement for the security of their property and person. As a result, fewer citizens now recognize their responsibility to take an active role in the prevention of crime and for their personal safety.

Police officers make more arrests each year, but criminal activities continue to rise. Here in Selinsgrove, as well as nationwide, homeowners are being victimized every day at an ever-increasing rate. No one is immune. The time has come when citizens can no longer solely depend on others for their security. They must take an active role to assist. Burglary is a crime of opportunity, committed by criminals who capitalize on carelessness or neglect. Most home burglaries are not committed by professionals who have planned to commit a burglary. Most are committed by amateurs, who find an open or unlocked door or window, or drug abusers who take advantage of a home's weak defenses. To combat the increase in crime in today's society, the police need the eyes and ears of citizens like you. To help you help yourself, your community, and the police to protect your property from criminals you must get involved. You cannot make your home, your property, and yourself crime proof, but you can make them crime resistant.

The Selinsgrove Borough Police Department recommends the following:

- Be observant. Report any unusual or suspicious behavior to the police. Write down descriptions of the person(s) and license number of any vehicles.
- Keep a trusted neighbor informed if your house will be unoccupied for an extended period. It is important to give your neighbor contact information if an emergency should arise. Also, notify the borough police of your absence.
- Look after your neighbor's house when they are away, and ask them to look after yours. This includes collecting mail, newspapers and other deliveries which would indicate at a glance that no one is home.
- Above all, be concerned. It is the most effective way to reduce or prevent crime and make your neighborhood safe. Often spending a few extra seconds watching strangers who are walking or driving through your neighborhood can be enough to prevent crimes.
- *And remember -- Your job is to report crime. The responsibility for apprehending criminals belongs to the police.*

By being aware of these recommendations, you are making your home, your neighborhood, and your community a safer place to live.

"A good neighbor is one of the most effective crime prevention tools ever invented." Make crime prevention part of every persons daily routine, just by watching out for each other. Your job is to *report* suspicious activity to police. It is *their* job to investigate and apprehend the criminal.

How To Select a Good Contractor

This may seem daunting but it's straightforward. A good tip I can give you is try to select contractors you may need on an urgent basis, before you need them. Why? Because if you have an emergency repair and you need to find someone quickly who is qualified and competitive, you don't have time to go through a lengthy selection process. I'm not talking about getting a bid for work you don't need, but try to at least get the names before you need them, of some well recommended emergency contractors, like a plumbing or heating contractor.

The easiest, and one of the best ways to select a possible contractor, is to get references from friends, family or a Realtor you trust.

Once you have some names, meet with them, look for "chemistry" or rapport between you and them and observe their level of professionalism. Courtesy, respect, punctuality and the ability to communicate are some of the most important attributes a contractor can have in addition to their basic competency. Actually, no matter how good someone is, if they don't click with you on these points, don't hire them.

Emergency Management Why Prepare?

Emergencies or disasters can happen anytime and they usually occur with little or no warning. When an emergency occurs, safety and speedy recovery will depend on existing levels of preparedness and a coordinated response. Selinsgrove Borough adheres to the National Incident Management System (NIMS) required by the federal government. NIMS was developed so emergency responders from different jurisdictions and disciplines could work together more efficiently in response to natural disasters and emergencies. NIMS benefits include a unified approach to incident management; standard command and management structures; and emphasis on preparedness, mutual aid and resource management.

Selinsgrove Borough has adopted an Incident Command Structure which is available for inspection at the Borough Office. The assignments for Responsible Person(s) in the Incident Command Structure will transition from those shown for a MINOR INCIDENT to those shown for a REGIONAL DISASTER/CATASTROPHE as the circumstances of the incident warrant. The Borough Manager, DH&L Fire Company Chief, Director of Public Works and the Borough Treasurer have multiple assignments for MINOR INCIDENTS and specific "primary assignments" for a REGIONAL DISASTER/CATASTROPHE. As the multiple duties become too much for any of these persons, they shall delegate one or more of these activities, other than their primary assignment, to another person(s).

Preparedness reviews are periodically undertaken to update and educate responders.

The effective dissemination of information is critical during an emergency. The Borough has in place many ways to communicate with its residents; telephone, radio, email, etc. The use of each of these depends on the resources available during an emergency situation.

The most important step you can take in disaster preparedness is having a plan. Knowing what to do and how to do it can help your family manage disasters with less fear and uncertainty.

- Decide what you and your family would do in each potential emergency situation.
 - Draw a floor plan of your home showing escape routes.
 - Choose a place away from your neighborhood where family members can meet in case you are separated and cannot return home due to a disaster.
 - Identify a friend or relative who lives out of the area for family members to contact if you are separated.
 - Post emergency numbers by every phone and teach children how and when to dial 911.
 - Know how to shut off the water, gas and electricity at the main switches in your home.
 - Plan how to help elderly or disabled neighbors in a disaster.
- Family preparedness is the most important step you can take in helping your family during an emergency or disaster.

During her employment at UMDNJ, Carol was the recipient of the university’s Presidential Performance Award. Carol’s employment with the Access Group led to her accepting the position of Assistant Vice President of Loan Servicing with Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency . After 3 years in student loan servicing, Carol was then promoted to Vice President of New Ventures and Client Relations. She then moved on to accept a position closer to her home as Associate Director of Financial Aid at Susquehanna University. In February 2006, she returned to AES/PHEAA as Assistant Vice President of Marketing and Product Development and currently has oversight of AES/PHEAA’s National Business Development Division.

More About Shane Hendricks:

Shane Hendricks ties to Selinsgrove run very deep. His sons, Noah and Zachary, are students in the school district. His wife, Christi, is an English teacher at the high school. Shane’s family traces its residence on the Isle of Que to the 1830’s and his sons are the sixth generation to reside in the family home- stead. Four previous generations of his family have also served on Borough Council. When first approached about running for Council, he didn’t think he had the time. When he thought back to being raised here, he knew there had been no finer place to grow up, nor better people to be surrounded by. This was what he wanted for his children.

Shane is a “79 graduate of Selinsgrove Area High School and an “83 graduate of York College, with a degree in Criminal Justice, with a Minor in sociology. During that time, he worked as a lifeguard at the Selinsgrove Pool, volunteered as an EMT/Firefighter for DH&L, worked as a Dispatcher for the County, and was a Selinsgrove Police Department Auxiliary Officer. He is an eight year veteran US Navy Pilot, and has been employed with American Airlines in NYC for the last 15 years. It’s a long way to commute, but he wouldn’t live anywhere else. His free time is divided between coaching Little League and Midget Football, and working on projects at Kidsgrove, the Parks, and the Ice Skating Rink.

His reasons for running for Council fall into three areas of service. The first is the safety of the people of Selinsgrove. This means doing what we can for DH&L and the Selinsgrove Police Department. Second is enhancing the welfare of the community. Without improving the services within the community, such as Parks, Library, etc, there is no motivation for people to live within the Borough. Third is the economic viability of our Borough. More About Erik Viker:

Erik Viker was elected to Selinsgrove’s Borough Council on November 6, 2007 as a Libertarian Party candidate, taking office in January 2008. “As a Libertarian, I will represent the interests of my fellow residents from a perspective of fiscal responsibility, self-reliance and minimal government intrusion into citizens’ lives,” says Mr. Viker. First Junior Council Person for Borough

Selinsgrove Borough Mayor Pete Carroll recently administered the oath of office to Morgan Botdorf as Selinsgrove Borough's first Junior Council Person. Morgan is the daughter of William and Marilyn Botdorf, and lives on the Isle of Que. She is currently a junior at Selinsgrove High School and is involved in the Spanish Club, Student Council, the SADD Club, and Chorus. When not working to maintain A's in her classes, including Advance Placement Biology and English 3 Honors, she also finds time to waitress at Mancino's Pizza and to baby sit. Borough Council looks forward to Morgan's contribution to the workings of our Council and Community.

Borough Council recently initiated this new program to educate and involve youth in their local government and to reach out to involve possible future members of Council to benefit both the youth and all resident of the Borough. The Junior Council Person Program, as established and fostered by the Pennsylvania State Association of Boroughs (PSAB), seeks to encourage Boroughs to have high school age students participate in the workings of their local government in a non-voting capacity. UTILITY LINE CLEARING and DIRECTIONAL PRUNING

Overhead power, telephone and TV cable lines must be maintained in order for reliable service. We all expect reliable service from these utility companies. One form of maintenance is trimming trees so the limbs do not interfere with the service lines.

Recently PPL contracted with a tree service to trim trees that are or may affect their electric service lines. The Selinsgrove Shade Tree Commission worked with the tree service company to ensure proper pruning standards were used when trimming any public shade tree.

Trees on private property were also trimmed. The Shade Tree Commission requested that the same pruning standards and best practices be used on private trees as well. Some of these practices are: 1) not allowing the use of climbing spikes when pruning trees. Climbing spikes should only be used when the tree will be removed. 2) not allowing the "topping" of any tree. All pruning should be done under the ANSI A300 standards set forth for tree pruning. 3) using "directional pruning" where ever necessary. Directional pruning may look odd, but it is the best way to keep the utility lines clear and maintain the health of the tree.

The work was completed in early February. In final discussions with PPL, the Shade Tree Commission learned that some homeowners did not like the looks of directional pruning and have since "topped" or rounded-over the crowns of some trees. The practice of topping or rounding-over can have safety concerns once the trees resprout new limbs.

As stated, directional pruning may look odd or unnatural, but it is widely accepted as the best compromise when dealing with utility line clearing. The theory is that the tree will maintain much of its crown and will not feel the need to push out new growth from the pruning cuts. This keeps future limbs from interfering with utility lines and, at least from one or two sides, the tree maintains its natural crown shape. There are four basic types of directional pruning, side, "V", crown reduction, and crown raising.


Side Pruning is done when utility lines pass through the side of a tree. If possible the branches are cut back to a lateral branch that is large enough to assume the primary growth role. Or, a branch is pruned at the branch collar where the limb attaches to the tree trunk. **"V" Pruning** is done where utility lines pass through the center of a tree. This removes limbs lower in the tree at the branch collar or at lateral branches when possible. **Crown Reduction** pruning is done where utility lines pass directly over the top of the tree. This is done by cutting branches at laterals lower in the tree that are 1/3 the diameter of the branch being removed. **Crown Raising** is where utility lines pass through the lower limbs of a tree. This is done by removing the lower branches to allow the lines to pass under the crown still keeping the recommended clearances.

Water, Sewer and Recycling Bills

All bills for water, sewer and recycling services are due and payable on the 20th day of February, May, August and November. Failure to receive a bill shall not exempt a customer from the obligation to pay the bill by its due date. A bill that is unpaid after its due date shall be delinquent and shall be subject to a one-time only penalty of twenty-five percent of the amount due.

“Go Green” in the Grove

The phrase “Go Green” has become synonymous with becoming actively interested in environmental issues and supporting environmental causes. Included in this newsletter, you will find information on our recycling opportunities for 2008. Every year, these facilities are being used by more and more Borough residents, businesses and institutions who understand how important recycling is as an environmental cause and how easy it is to make a difference. Since 1991, Selinsgrove Borough residents have been required to recycle clear glass, colored glass, aluminum and leaf waste and Selinsgrove Borough businesses and institutions have been required to recycle high-grade office paper, aluminum, corrugated paper and leaf waste. Today, the Borough provides a number of different opportunities to recycle and provides residents, businesses and institutions alike, an opportunity to recycle Tin/Steel Cans; Aluminum Beverage Cans; Clear, Blue/Green and Brown Glass; #1 and #2 Plastic Bottles and Jars; Corrugated Cardboard; Hi-Grade Office Paper; Newspapers; Magazines and Catalogs; Batteries; Leaves; Brush; Christmas Trees; and Garden Residue. This year, you should note the addition of a second Saturday morning each month for the Drop-Off Recycling Center. This year we are also accepting Batteries at the Drop-Off Recycling Center and have added one Curb-Side Collection of “Garden Residues” to our annual Recycling programs. Please do all that you can to help to “Go Green in the Grove.”

SELINGSGROVE LITTLE LEAGUE AUXILIARY ANNOUNCES FUND-RAISING CAMPAIGN FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS FOR BASEBALL FIELD

There are few things more exciting for a Little League ballplayer, than hearing their name from a PA booth during a game, nor more emotional than singing the National Anthem before a game. These memories, good sportsmanship and growth as a player, are things which they can be proud of their entire lives.

The Selinsgrove Little League Auxiliary is planning to make some major improvements to the Rotary Field, located on Broad Street in Selinsgrove. The improvements are aimed towards making the field more enjoyable for the players and fans, in addition to hosting future tournaments for the area. These tournaments generally attract larger numbers of spectators and generate increased revenue for local businesses. The town has been bypassed for a number of years, because it lacked the amenities the District looks for in selecting a host field. Selinsgrove has the opportunity to host this summer’s 11/12 year old Sectional All-Star Tournament.

The improvements consist of the purchase and installation of an electronic scoreboard, improvements to infield drainage, the construction of an announcer/scorekeeper box, and the purchase of a flagpole. There are also some safety improvements to the facility which are mandated by Little League Baseball, Inc.

The Auxiliary is asking for the support of local businesses to sponsor banners along the outfield fence. I have been in contact with Ace of Signs, who will handle the manufacture of the banners. We are asking each interested business for an initial \$200 donation, followed by a \$50 yearly donation for future seasons. Upon completion of the season, the banners will be stored to ensure many years of use.

The Auxiliary is also seeking donations from those in the community who remember playing Little League as a youth, those who have had children and grandchildren play, and those who think that Little League is a valuable resource for the town’s youth and economy. Finally, the Auxiliary will also seek funding from other sources.

New Regulations Pertaining to Residential Rental Properties

Beginning January 2008, Selinsgrove Borough has initiated a new program of significant benefit and importance to our community. Following deliberations and discussions over nearly 3 years, regulations have been adopted that will significantly assist the Borough in monitoring and regulating both the maintenance and operation of all residential rental properties within the Borough. Although modeled after a similar regulation in the Town of Bloomsburg that pertained to only university student tenants, the regulations adopted in Selinsgrove pertain to all tenants. The new program includes an implementation schedule that will require approximately 3 years to achieve full compliance. In the interim, a checklist has been prepared and provided to assist landlords and tenants in evaluating the health-safety issues under the Borough’s Property Maintenance Code prior to signing a lease. For the first time, all landlords will be required to use a written lease, to stipulate the number of persons permitted within or on the leased premises, to identify a responsible party residing within 40 miles of the Borough and to complete an inspection under the Borough’s property maintenance code once every three years.

These new regulations and the administrative structure behind the regulations will continue to rely on reports of violations of any Borough Ordinances from Borough residents. These reports are to be directed to either the Borough Police Department or the Borough Manager, who share responsibilities for following up on such reports. As these new regulations apply to Susquehanna University students renting off-campus, the University will be an integral part of the administrative structure. The new administrative structure will require landlords to take effective actions to prohibit a reoccurrence of the violation and includes penalties for non-compliance that can include an order to evict tenants and a prohibition from renting the premises.

Smoke Detectors Required in Owner Occupied Residences

With the adoption of the Property Maintenance Code in 2004, all residential properties within the Borough are required to have smoke alarms: one on every level, one immediately outside sleeping rooms and one inside every sleeping room. This regulation applies to both rental properties and to **owner-occupied properties**. Please comply with this requirement because it can save lives. In a recent apartment building fire in Selinsgrove, the occupants were alerted to a fire in a wall by the smoke alarms around 4 AM. The occupants were able to safely exit the building, the fire department was alerted shortly after the fire began, and the fire was quickly and easily extinguished. The limited amount of smoke in the building was exhausted quickly and tenants returned to their homes within two hours. Without smoke alarms, this could have been another tragic front page news story.

Disputes Concerning Water, Sewer and Recycling Bills

Any customer who wishes to dispute a bill shall bring or mail the bill, within ten (10) days of receipt, to the Borough Office. The Borough will check the meter readings and the calculation of the bill, then confirm the original bill or issue a corrected bill. Although meter reading, data entry and calculation errors can occur, it is the Borough's experience, without exception, that water meters do not record more water usage than is actually used.

Adjustments to Sewer Charges for Special Circumstances

Adjustments to the Sewer Charges on a Water, Sewer and Recycling Bill may be made for special circumstances. For the filling of swimming pools and significant irrigation or construction projects using water from an individual water service, adjustments will be made if the customer calls the Borough Office in advance of the activity, takes the water meter readings required and provides these readings to the Borough Office immediately upon the completion of the activity. For water service line breaks and leaks, adjustments will be made for the currently due bill only and only if it can be verified that a quantity of water did not enter the sanitary sewer system of the Borough. Contact the Borough Manager immediately upon discovery of such conditions to have this verification completed. The Borough Office will try to notify customers if it notices unusually high water usage in the course of the preparation of a quarterly bill, but this is a manual process relying only on the observation and cognitive skills of the person preparing more than 1800 individual bills each quarter.

Verify Your Water Consumption

Customers are strongly advised to verify that no water use is being recorded by the water meter when no water is being used and that the water consumption over a period of time is not unusually or unexplainably high. Dripping faucets, leaking toilet tank seals, plumbing leaks, intermittently malfunctioning or inefficiently adjusted water softeners, intermittently malfunctioning furnace pressure-relief valves, etc. will result in increases in water and sewer charges that are normally significantly more expensive than the cost to correct the conditions. The smallest of leaks can be detected through the careful observation of the water meter. Once a leak is detected, contact the Borough Office for some suggestions on how to locate the source(s) of the leak.
