

USTA COMMUTE

Tired of driving? Relax and ride. Call USTA Commute to save time, save money, save wear and tear.

USTA Commute is designed to accommodate commuters who drive to a regular destination from a regular starting point on a regular basis to pool their individual commute into one vehicle. This service is intended to reduce the cost of traveling to/from work or school.

They currently have two (2) commuter vans heading to Harrisburg from our local area. They expect to place new vans on the road in 2014. To form a new vanpool there should be at least seven (7) full-time participants, one (1) primary driver and a backup. Each vanpool is unique and sets its own operating policies such as pickup and drop-off points, drive-times, seating arrangements, etc. A vanpool group can create its own points of origin and destination.

In addition to their commuter vans, USTA Commutes **Rideshare Program** also accommodates commuters interested in carpooling.

USTA also accommodates the **Commuter Benefit**, a federal qualified transportation fringe benefit (26 U.S. Code Section 132) offered by employers to employees that includes vanpools.

USTA's **Guaranteed Ride Home Program** ensures participants of an early ride home because of an emergency.

Zoning Permits Required

Property owners are required to obtain a Zoning Permit prior to excavating, erecting, altering or converting any structure.

Contact Janet Powers at the Borough Office for questions regarding a Zoning Permit. All structures, including portable structures, require a Zoning Permit. The Selinsgrove Borough Ordinance allows up to 30 days for review and approval of Zoning Permits.



Parking Available for the Public

Travel Conditions

Tentatively, UGI Penn Natural Gas, Inc., will be extending a high-pressure natural gas main along Broad Street from the area of the Selinsgrove High School to Susquehanna University during the summer months. The university is planning to convert from coal-fired boilers to natural gas. Property owners fronting on Broad Street that are interested in a natural gas service should contact UGI.

IS A RAIN BARREL RIGHT FOR YOU?

Rain barrels benefit the environment by reducing the amount of stormwater that flows across the landscape into our waterways and storm sewers. This reduces water pollution because stormwater runoff can contain pollutants like sediment, oil, grease, bacteria, and nutrients. This is important because pollution can kill fish in your favorite fishing spot, dirty your favorite swimming hole and ruin the source of your drinking water.

A rain barrel is a waterproof container that sits under the downspout of your roof, collecting and storing rainwater before it flows into a storm sewer or local waterway.

A rain barrel will save the average homeowner about 1,300 gallons of water during the peak summer months. Rain barrels are an excellent source of "softwater" since the rain contains no calcium, lime or chlorine. This makes it ideal for gardens, flower pots and even window and car washing.

Ready-made rain barrels can be purchased from hardware stores and garden centers, but it is relatively simple and less expensive to make one yourself.






Selinsgrove Area Community Pool

Buried Utility Lines and Pennsylvania 8-1-1

Call PA One Call at 8-1-1 (or 1-800-242-1776) **before** you begin any project that will disturb the earth with powered equipment. This is important because knowing the approximate location of your buried lines before each digging project helps protect you and others from injury. This service is provided free of charge by your utilities.



Utility workers responding to PA One Call will mark the location of their lines using different colors of paint, to represent their particular utility, and these should remain visible and unaltered until all excavation in the area is completed. Removing, moving or otherwise tampering with the marks can cause interruption of service, increase monthly bills, or result in injury. Violation of the Pennsylvania Utility Line Protection Act 287, can result in a fine of up to \$50,000 or imprisonment of up to 90 days, or both.

PERMITS REQUIRED FOR EXCAVATION

Zoning Permits are required for excavation within the Borough. A general permit from DEP is also required if the excavation is within 50 feet of a stream. An earth disturbance of less than 5,000 square feet requires both a Best Management Practices and a Small Projects Erosion and Sedimentation Control Plan be filed with the Borough with an application for a Zoning Permit. For an earth disturbance of 5,000 square feet or more, an Erosion and Sedimentation Control Plan approved by the Snyder County Conservation District must be provided as part of a Land Development Plan.

SEWER LATERAL INFORMATION

The sewer lateral line (sometimes called the service pipe) is the pipe that extends from your home through your yard and connects into the sewer "lateral" near the curb line or edge of an easement. The owner of the property is responsible for maintaining and cleaning the home sewer line as well as the line to the connection point at the lateral. A cleanout is typically installed near the connection point and is considered part of the home sewer line.

A sewer lateral is the short pipe line that extends from the sewer main to the curb or property line, or where the home sewer connects.

A sewer main is a larger pipeline, usually in the street or through an easement, that transports the sewage from many homes and buildings to the wastewater treatment plant.

The Sewer Authority is responsible for maintenance of the sewer lateral and sewer main only.

National Flood Insurance Participation



The Borough continues to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program and the Community Rating Service, which requires the community to re-certify annually. The ongoing enforcement of Flood Plain Regulations and the continuous record keeping by the Borough Zoning Office has resulted in the Borough obtaining the highest CRS rating, a Class 7, in Snyder County. The Class 7 rating entitles Borough residents to a 15% reduction of flood insurance premiums for those in the flood plain and a 5% reduction for residents not located within the flood plain. You can contact your insurance agency to verify that you are receiving the appropriate discount. Any home located within the Borough can be covered by National Flood Insurance, the home does not have to be located within a designated flood plain. There is a 30 day waiting period for flood insurance coverage to take effect. Don't wait until the next flood to insure your home!

FLOOD AWARENESS

Local Flood Hazard - Properties within Selinsgrove's flood plains are subject to three (3) types of flooding:

Overbank Flooding: The major flood problem facing Selinsgrove is due to flooding of the Susquehanna River. The flooding is usually caused by storms covering a large portion of the Susquehanna River Valley upstream of Selinsgrove. Rapid snow melt and ice jams can add to the problem. Advanced flood warnings are generally available for large stream flooding. Penns Creek is also subject to flooding from the same causes, but with shorter advance notice.

Local Drainage Problems: Segments of Broad Street, Liberty Alley, and North High Street at Snyder are several of the areas in which storm water collects and cannot drain quickly, causing them to be inundated during downpours.

Sewer Back-Ups: When the lower portions of the Borough drainage system become inundated, sewers back-up and flow to the lowest openings, which are basements for sanitary sewers, and streets for storm sewers.

The Flood Warning System - Selinsgrove's flood warning system has many components. The Snyder County Emergency Management Agency and Communication Center conducts 24-hour monitoring of weather reports and river forecasts from the National Weather Service and Mid-Atlantic River Forecast Center. The Communications Center and National Weather Service issue flood watches and warnings for the Susquehanna River and smaller streams. Residents are advised of possible flooding events through local radio stations Emergency Broadcast Systems (EBS). In some areas, firemen, Borough employees, and/or police go door-to-door to alert residents. Unnecessary risks to rescue personnel can be avoided if residents promptly evacuate when notified by officials.

Flood Insurance - Standard homeowner's or renters' insurance policies do **not** cover losses due to flooding. Selinsgrove participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), so any property owner in Selinsgrove Borough can obtain federally-backed flood insurance. Flood insurance is available through insurance carriers to property owners for buildings and contents, and to tenants for personal property. For homes located in flood prone areas and purchased with federally-backed mortgages, flood insurance may be required. Information about flood insurance and rates can be obtained from insurance agents. There is a 30-day waiting period before flood insurance policies take effect. Selinsgrove is working to continue discounts to flood insurance policies through the Community Rating System (CRS) Program.

Property Protection Measures - Every year flooding causes more property damage than any other type of natural disaster. In order to reduce flood losses, businesses and residents can take the following precautions: **1.** Organize inventory for speedy removal to higher locations within a facility or off-site. **2.** Install closures to prevent water backups through drains. **3.** Elevate buildings above flood levels. **4.** Relocate furnaces and electrical panels to higher floors.

For help making the decision on what you, as a property owner, should do to prepare for flooding check out the information or FEMA publications located in the Borough Office. FEMA publications are also available at the Gelnett Public Library.

Floodplain Development Requirements - Development in the floodplain must comply with the Borough Floodplain Ordinances. If any work is to be performed in any flood hazard area, contact the Borough Code Office. CATS RUNNING AT LARGE

Some Borough residents have voiced their concern with cats that have been running loose around town. Because of this we would like to reiterate the ordinance on dogs, cats and other animals. Here are a few highlights of this ordinance:

-It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to permit any dog, cat or other animal owned, kept, maintained or in the custody or control of such person or persons to run at large, either upon the public streets, sidewalks, highways, alleys or thoroughfares of the Borough of Selinsgrove or upon the private property of any other person or persons, and unaccompanied by the owner or keeper.

-Every person who owns, controls, harbors, possesses or keeps any dog, cat or other animal over the age of six (6) months in the Borough of Selinsgrove shall procure an identification tag for said animal. The identification tag shall contain the name, address and telephone number of the owner of the animal. Dogs are required to be licensed.

-No dog, cat or other animal shall be permitted in or upon any public street, sidewalk, alley, park, parkway or other public place in the Borough or in or upon any property belonging to said Borough unless said animals are on a leash and are under the complete control of the person owning or, at the time, in possession of said animal.

-It shall be unlawful for any person owning or being in charge, care, control or custody of any dog, cat or other animal to suffer or permit any such animal to trespass on private property.

-No person owning, harboring or keeping or in charge of any animal shall cause, suffer or allow such animal to soil, defile, defecate on or commit any nuisance on any common thoroughfare, sidewalk, passageway, alley, bypass, play area, park or any place where people congregate or walk upon any public property without the permission of the owner of said property. The person who so curbs such animal shall immediately remove all feces deposited by such animal.

-Any person found guilty of violating the provisions of this chapter, after a summary proceeding before a District Magistrate for the Borough, shall forfeit and pay to the Borough of Selinsgrove a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.) but not more than three hundred dollars (\$300.), plus costs of prosecution.

Brush Pickup Monday, May 5, 2014

Brush, branches, tree limbs and tree trimmings (no bigger than 4" in diameter, and limited to 1 cubic yard-equal to a combined container capacity of 200 gallons) will be picked up curbside. Garden residue, twigs, vines, soft stem plants and weeds (no grass clippings, roots, dirt or soil debris, or garbage bags) must be placed in moisture-proof, open-top containers capable of permitting materials to be picked up and dumped into a truck (limit of 30 pounds/container). Items are to be placed along the curb, but not in the street, before 7:00 AM.



Selinsgrove to Celebrate PIANO PALOOZA this Summer!

Selinsgrove Piano Palooza is a public art project that celebrates both music and visual art. Approximately eight (8) whimsically painted pianos will be placed in downtown Selinsgrove. The pianos themselves, painted and prettified, will become works of art. Each piano will have a "piano-buddy," either a business or individual, who volunteers to sponsor and look after the piano. Each piano will also display a plaque explaining the program and the care of the piano. In the event of rain and at night, a plastic cover will protect each instrument. Throughout the summer of 2014, we anticipate not only local people, but folks traveling from outside the area to witness such an imaginative and surprising art/music phenomenon. At the culmination of the project, the pianos will be donated to schools and community groups or auctioned off.

The project will, hopefully, make the piano less precious, more tactile and engaging. The piano, after all, is a democratic instrument that any person of any age and ability can walk up to and play—at least some notes! This will be an invitation to the community to support the arts and music.

We will involve all members of the community from artists and musicians to children and senior citizens. We will open on the first Saturday in June with "Piano Palooza:" a select group of pianists will each sit down to a piano that they will play to open the festivities. It will be a celebration of the arts! An then, throughout the summer, anyone and everyone is invited to play and listen to the music. We hope to enjoy impromptu street performances as everyone delights at finding a piano, usually housed in concert halls and living rooms, in such an unexpected place. The point is simple: bring communities together through random acts of public music.

He served seven (7) years of active duty military service in the United States Army and had been deployed once to Iraq.

Officer Fortin is currently serving his probationary period as a full-time police officer and will complete field training with the Selinsgrove Police in March 2014.

A NOTE FROM THE CHIEF OF POLICE



The Selinsgrove Police Department has recently been questioned as to the risks of illicit Methamphetamine Laboratories (Meth Labs) operating within our area. Although such a risk is always possible, the actual potential risk to residents of the Borough is believed small.

Meth Labs are small, clandestine chemical processing operations that vary in size and scope. These operations can be set up anywhere, from the trunk of an automobile to larger scale operations in homes or industrial structures. The chemical processes to manufacture methamphetamine use many common household chemicals as well as chemical products including pseudoephedrine, acetone, hydrochloric acid, lye or other like chemicals. Commonly, the chemical processes involve the production of strong chemical odors. Additionally, locations often hide the activity by obstructing view into the location through windows, show excessive trash being generated with strong chemical odors, combined with suspicious behaviors of individuals at these locations.

Individuals suspecting this type of activity occurring should contact the Police Department to report their concerns at 570-374-8655.

BOROUGH TO WELCOME SUSQUEHANNA UNIVERSITY LCI INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

Susquehanna University will be hosting up to 15 international students starting in March 2014 and continuing through May 27, 2014. These students are from the Countries of Somalia, Saudi Arabia, China and Iraq. They range in age from 20-26 years of age and are interested in studying the English language. They will be studying at Susquehanna University with the hopes of matriculating into the university.

These students will vary as far as cultural background and appearance (some of the women may be in full covering). Please keep in mind that we should not assume country or origin because we can't base a culture or race off of looks.

Vehicles, Abandoned or Junked

Abandoned or junked vehicles are prohibited within the Borough if located on private or public property, if considered to be a nuisance. A public nuisance is defined as follows: *Any activity involving an abandoned or junked vehicle or part thereof which adversely affects, or causes an adverse effect on, the health, safety, comfort, sanitation and welfare of the residents of a neighborhood. Such activity shall include, but not be limited to, providing shelter or breeding areas for insects, snakes, rodents or other vermin, discharging oils, grease and gasoline into the air, water or land of the Borough, creating a fire hazard from the unsupervised storing of gasoline within an abandoned or junked vehicle or an attractive, dangerous condition to children and allowing the growth of weeds and brush in or around an abandoned or junked vehicle.*

A vehicle is considered abandoned if a certificate of junk has been issued by the PA Department of Transportation or the agency designated by any other state to issue such a certificate; or a vehicle not stored in garage or other enclosed structure in or on which if found any of the following conditions: its engine, motor or essential motor parts have been removed for more than fifteen (15) days; its tires or any tire has been deflated or its wheels or any wheel have been removed for more than seven (7) days; it bears no official inspection sticker or any such sticker is not current by more than fifteen (15) days.

"Abandoned or junked vehicle" does not include a vehicle when being repaired, restored or salvaged at a licensed junkyard, commercial garage, service station, auto repair center or body shop, provided that the storage of such vehicle does not create a hazard to the public health or a public nuisance.

Complaints regarding abandoned or junked vehicles should be directed to the Selinsgrove Borough Police Department.
